I got a phone call from Alan who was doing a little bit of shopping in Wellington Square after he'd been for a docs appointment. He had felt the need to sit down because his back was aching, probably because he'd been on his feet too long. It seems as he got close to the seat he was intending to sit on, he fell backwards and hit his head. People were helping him and an ambulance had been called when he first rang me. However, a very kind couple, realising that it might be ages for the ambulance to turn up, offered to take Alan to A&E and got the Wellington Square security man to cancel the ambulance that had been requested. They then brought their car round to near where Lidl used to be (opposite KFC) to where Alan was OK to walk. I said I'd drive to A&E and find Alan there. Not only did this couple kindly take Alan to A&E, they waited there with him till I arrived, and they had even bought Alan a bottle of water and a cake for each of us! It really restores your faith in human kindness! As you can imagine, we were at A&E for hours but fortunately after the general examination, blood pressure, ECG and a CT head scan were deemed OK, I was able to drive Alan home. Moving about is rather painful for him, but it could have been so much worse.

In the same email Pat told me that Brian had had a fall but fortunately no damage was done.

We hope that he soon makes a full recovery. Margaret Whitham

Whitby Chapel Opening Service

We had thought that Whitby Flowergate Chapel had closed for good back in October 2021, so it was very welcome news to hear from Rev. Margaret Kirk that it was having a "grand re-opening" on August 21st and that services would continue on a monthly basis. As Rev. Kirk told us:



"We are very excited about this as at the same time we are about to complete a licence arrangement with two community workers who provide arts-based activities and offer a community fridge and cafe in the basement of church premises nearby. They will be using our chapel throughout the week as auxiliary space and are very well regarded for the work they do! This arrangement has the support of a community regeneration officer from Scarborough Borough Council, and we're very fortunate to have had financial support for the toilet floor repairs from the YUU (Yorkshire Unitarian Union) which has now been completed, and the truss beams were repaired in February from our own funds and a grant from the Leonard Chamberlain Trust. Much more needs to be done but the chapel is now a safe space!"

On 21st August, Unitarians from the Newcastle and Stockton congregations headed to Whitby to join Unitarians from across Yorkshire for the grand re-opening. It was an excellent and well-attended service, with a short reading from Rev. Kirk about how we got to the point of re-opening, Rebecca Denniff from Flash Company Arts Ltd CIC outlining their plans for community use of the chapel, and the Whitby Community Choir giving a very well-received performance of 'Bread and Roses', which many members of the congregation joined in out (albeit some of us had to surreptitiously look up all the lyrics on our phones!) We enjoyed coffee and cakes afterwards, before heading home in the sunshine.

It was truly uplifting to see Whitby chapel returning to its rightful place as a valuable part of the local community, and inspirational for those of us here in Newcastle. We wish all involved all the best! Louise Reeve

3. A cover design for The News & Views. The News & Views is the quarterly magazine of the National Unitarian Fellowship which is distributed as a digital and` paper copy to all members of the Fellowship. The cover should reflect your interpretation of the theme, 'Finding my space' and contain 'National Unitarian Fellowship and the charity number 1040294. Email as a pdf to <u>nuf@nufonline.org.uk</u>. Value £100

4. A Unitarian hymn that reflects the theme of 'Finding my Space'. Minimum of two verses set to a recognised tune or original composition. Email as a pdf to

nuf@nufonline.org.uk. Value £100

5. Digital Connections Award. This prize for innovation in Digital Connections. The last two years have brought exciting new ways in which congregations and other groups have connected using technology. This award will be for the most innovative use of digital methods to broaden the reach of your Unitarian resources. This could be as simple as a new format for your email newsletters; podcasts, worship, videos, a revamped website, online meetings, discussion groups, activities or networking.

In the first place please submit a resume of your project, no longer than 1,000 words, giving links to resources where possible.

The judges will be looking for Digital connection projects that started or primarily evolved within the last $2^{1/2}$ years, and which are inclusive, accessible, creative and sustainable and you should explain how the project meets these criteria.

The prize for the winner is £200 but we hope to showcase all submissions in an (online) event in 2023, as an opportunity for connection and learning from each other.

Sunday July 24th 2022 Worship leaders Hazel & David Warhurst

Hazel and David reminded us of the origins of the Flower Communion by Norbert Capek and his wife. They chose hymns 19 Colour and Fragrance, 13 Bring Flowers to Our Altar, 159 The Green Grass Brings the Air to Life and 268 Moods of Summer. They gave us the meaning and language of flowers (Floriography), the sentiment the colours of flowers eg love. Also the flower for each month of the year. Those present brought a flower and placed it in a communal vase during the service and received a different flower at the close of the service.

Hazel read an English Fairy Story about The Proud Rose, the **rose** was so proud of her beautiful looks and her only complaint was



growing next to an ugly **cactus.** The service included a prayer and a Flower Communion Blessing. There were two songs projected onto the wall, with words, "Where have all the flowers gone" by Pete Seeger and "Rhymes and Reasons" by John Denver.

Sunday 31st July 2022 Worship leader Rev Margaret Kirk

Margaret looked at what makes us special. "Blessings feed life just as water does". We sang these hymns 75 HFL, 98, 119 and 195 SYF and closed with Joan Baez singing "Let us break bread together". The reading was the introduction from the book *My Grandfather's Blessings* by *Rachel Naomi Remen*. Her story ;*At the city gates'* was from the book *One hundred wisdom stories* by Margaret Silf. Sunday 14th August 2022 No service was held this Sunday as many members were away.

Sunday 21st August 2022 Visit to 11.00am service at Whitby, so no service held at Stockton.

Sunday 28th August 2022 was a Bring & Share service on the theme of Holidays. We sang these hymns 216, 167 and 148 SYF and 9 and 235 HFL. We opened with the Chalice Lighting:

"We light this chalice in celebration of holidays and holy days, days of fun, friendship and relaxation, enjoying time together and the world around us."

The Meditations were from the Holy Quiet by Richard S Gilbert, and the Readings were: Picnic from Patience Strong and Thank you for the big blue sea by M E Swann. The closing words were from John Wesley:

Margaret read "*The Hat*" a Frog and Toad story and some writings from David Foster Wallace (which Margaret read at the 2018) "A friend is one who you can pour out your heart."

Sunday 18th September 2022 led by Rev Paul Walker

We sang hymns 35, 84 SYF; 214 and 210 Jerusalem HFL

Sunday 25th September 2022 Harvest Festival led by Rev Victor Ball

Victor gave us *The Magic Beans* story for all ages. We sang 272, 272, 274 and 184 HFL Readings were *Mark 4: 24-32* and *The Peace and Plenty Petition* by Cathy Hunt. Victor closed with the harvest Prayer from the Community of the Cross of nails, Coventry Cathedral.
