Home Thoughts from the Lockdown:

How have you coped with the Covid-19 pandemic virus over the last 15 months? Or does it seem as if it has it lasted for longer than that? It seems to have gone on forever, but we know that will be the case for those folk who have lost a relative or very close friend. When the daily statistics come across our television screens each evening the first number I look at is the number of Covid-19 deaths that have been notified that day. Each day I have to remind myself that these are people, just like you and me, who have died. The numbers are mind blowing. Will it never end? And then of course we're only now having to cope with the after effects of the virus which seem to attack people in so many different ways.

Finally there's the worry and the fear of succumbing to the virus which can be just as debilitating in its own way. We at number one, up until now, have been most fortunate health wise, but... who knows?

Then there are other worries - losing contact with relatives and friends because we can't actually hug them, talk to them face to face or go shopping. Skype is OK and does allow us to talk one to one, and Zoom allows us to have meetings, but you can't talk to the person next to you at a Zoom meeting. Also, if you don't have a computer or iPad you are effectively cut off from seeing the person you are speaking to.

On the plus side we are told by Boris that from June 21st we shall be able to shop, go to concerts and the cinema, and talk to friends and relatives face to face. Things will be back to normal . . . or will things ever get back "normal"? What will "normal" look like? Shall we be able to go to a restaurant or the pictures without looking round to see if anyone is wearing a mask? If anyone coughs shall we instinctively move away from them? Will we have a fear of being too close to people or in a crowd? How long will it take us to resume our old habits, I wonder?

Exciting Times at Flowergate Old Chapel?

On March 19th the **Darlington and Stockton Times** carried a piece about the government's Town Fund. The Budget on March 3rd included the announcement of an award of £17.1m to boost economic growth in Whitby. The report in the paper included the following paragraph in a list of possible projects under consideration:

Innovation Hub: a digital space for entrepreneurs and learning opportunities within Flowergate Chapel, the origins of which date back to the 13th Century.

Knowing how hard Rev Margaret Kirk has been working on this project the Editor asked her to bring us up to date. This is what she wrote:

"Thank you for sending me the piece from the D&S paper.

I think what you have there is a breakdown of the main projects, which includes ours, and was prepared by Scarborough Borough Council (SBC) some time ago in quite a glossy Towns Investment Fund Brochure. This was some time in October, I think and well before the news earlier this month, that the government had agreed £17.1 million of the £25 m for Whitby.

Since then we have needed to put our skates on as SBC asked for detailed project brief, risk assessment and development planning documents by yesterday from all the projects. This was a big ask in a very tight time frame and we decided to ask the *Friends of Flowergate* for funding to employ a professional consultation company, who deal with charities, to do the bulk of the work. It was the best decision we made. They have been terrific, working closely

with Neil Swannick, who is directing the project, liaising with a variety of people, using research to strengthen the economic case.

The project brief submitted yesterday reads very well and I think we have a a strong chance of getting through this first stage to stage two at which point there is development funding available leading to the first business plan submission, followed by a second one, after which it goes to the Treasury for full approval



around October.

The main issue we have to address is finding a further £360, 000 for revenue funding. It will take five years to break even and the Towns Fund only provide capital funding.

So, "edging forward" is about right and we'll be very exercised over the next month looking for other funders knowing that it won't pass the next hurdles unless match funding is in place and looks sustainable. I am optimistic despite the challenges ahead".

Zooming into 2021 - a Round-up of Recent Services

The continuation of Coronavirus restrictions meant that all our services during this period took place online by Zoom. This can never give us the warmth and fellowship of meeting together face to face and how we have missed singing together, which we love to do at Stockton. A particular sadness for all of us is that some much loved regular attenders at services in the church have been unable to join us on Zoom for technical reasons. We miss them very much and look forward to the day, hopefully before long now, when we can meet together again.

However, it's by no means all on the negative side. Once we got to grips with Zoom - and a special shout out here to Margaret Robinson who has taken on the role of Zoom Master for us - we discovered some unexpected benefits. Zoom allowed people to join our services from afar and it has been lovely to welcome them. In turn we have been able to join the Zoom services of other congregations. Zoom has allowed service leaders to introduce all kinds of special effects, such as pictures, video clips, music and the like, for us to enjoy on our screens at home.

Also on the 'plus' side, it has to be said, is the ability to 'meet' together for services without having to make journeys before and afterwards - something that was particularly appreciated during the cold winter months, especially when we had so much snow and ice on the ground.

Another benefit of Zoom has been the facility to invite people from almost any location, too far away to visit us in normal times, to take services as if they were beside us in the room; all courtesy of the seemingly magical powers of the internet! During this period Rev John Midgley and Helen Mason led services, supplementing our regular team of service leaders - Revs Margaret Kirk, Victor Ball, Paul Walker and Margaret Robinson and members of the Worship Group.

The services have, I believe, maintained a very high standard, covering a variety of subjects but always thoughtful, interesting, informative and often challenging and very moving in content. Here are some of the highlights:

January 3rd: A **Bring and Share** service looking forward to better times in 2021.

January 10th: Rev Paul Walker's theme was **Being on the right side of history**. Paul gave us a number of examples of times when

courageous men and women, often reviled and persecuted, took stands against issues of the time, such as slavery, women's rights, racism, Nazism and, more recently, climate change. They were on the right side of history. All good changes come about by people who are prepared to stand with the minority. One of Paul's readings was a hard -hitting poem by David Kossoff - *Dirty World*.

January 17th: Rev Victor Ball spoke of *The Time of Re-awakening*, thinking about the things we have learned about different ways of doing things as we emerge from these extraordinary times. Perhaps we are seeing a deeper wisdom.

January 24th: Rev Margaret Kirk's theme was **Levelling**. The phrase *levelling up* is much tossed around these days in the context of areas in the north which have fallen behind the rest of the country. It's a good slogan and few would object to the idea. The Levellers campaigned for equal rights and freedom of speech until, by 1650, the movement was crushed. It seemed like the ideals had been stamped out but they kept re-appearing and our religious tradition built on them, forged out of a passion to bring equal rights and freedom to all.

Then came the United States *Declaration of Independence* based on the same principles. Most of us had been immersed in following the recent saga of the US Presidential election which had shown how fragile democracy can be. We may have breathed a sigh of relief about the outcome but we still have much levelling to do. In conclusion Margaret said "let us not forget these words of Robert F Kennedy":

"Few will have the greatness to bend history itself, but each of us can work to change a small portion of events. It is from numberless diverse acts of courage and belief that human history is shaped. Each time a man stands up for an ideal, or acts to improve the lot of others, or strikes out against injustice, he sends forth a tiny ripple of hope, and crossing each other from a million different centers of energy and daring those ripples build a current which can sweep down the mightiest walls of oppression and resistance."

January 31st: This was taken by the Worship Group on the theme **Uplifting - Improving the mood; causing cheerfulness**. It was a compendium of uplifting music, readings, hymns and prayers raising our spirits after the cold, wintry month of January.

February 7th: *Earth - A pale blue dot* was the intriguing theme chosen by Rev Paul Walker. He showed us a video by Carl Sagan, *Pale Blue Dot*, which dramatically illustrates how the Earth, with all its

strife, turmoil and suffering, is but a tiny speck in the vastness of space. Quote: *There is no hint that help will come from elsewhere to save us from ourselves.* It was profound, and somewhat chastening, to have our earthly concerns put into proper perspective like this.

To lighten the mood Paul closed the service with *The Galaxy Song* from *Monty Python's Meaning of Life* - very amusing but, in its way, equally profound!

February 14th: Rev John Midgley was our visiting service leader on this occasion, accompanied by his wife, Rev Celia Midgley. John's theme was *Love and Truth*, very appropriate for St Valentine's Day with readings, hymns and prayers suited to the theme. These included Kahlil Gibran's *On Love* which was beautifully read by John.

We were then treated to a fascinating address about *The Religion of Donald Trump*. John traced the early influence on the young Donald Trump of his domineering father and a preacher, Rev Norman Vincent Peale, whose *Gospel of Success* was dinned into Trump. He took this to such extremes that failure was never admissible and we all saw this play out during his Presidency. Trump is the very opposite of a Unitarian. For us *Love is the doctrine of this church, and the quest for Truth is its sacrament*.

February 21st: This was an *Interfaith Service*, led by Rev Victor Ball. Readings were included from Ramakrishna, Swami Vivekananda and from the first meeting of the World Council of Faiths. It was good to have visitors join us from the Cleveland and Tees Valley Interfaith, one of whom, Hassan, gave a short talk on the subject of *Fasting as a Spiritual Practice* which was much appreciated.

February 28th: Rev Margaret Kirk's subject for this service was **Snowdrop**, celebrating snowdrops as springtime approaches, with *The Snowdrop Story*, memories of the *Greatham Snowdrop Walk* with photos and appropriate words and music, together with contributions from members of the congregation.

March 7th: *Freedom* was Rev Victor Ball's topic. Beginning with an extract from Dr Martin Luther King's famous *I have a dream . .* Speech, Victor remarked on how easy it is for us to take for granted the freedoms that we enjoy today. He then traced the struggles through the centuries to gain these freedoms. Yet there are still so many places in the world where tyrannical and oppressive regimes hold sway, denying people these basic human rights. There is still much to do.

March 14th: This was well attended for **Mothering Sunday** and Margaret Robinson put together a delightful service to do justice to it.

There was a *Poem for Mother's* Day by an anonymous child, a *Prayer For All who Mother* by Victoria Weinstein and lovely readings - *Honouring the Bouquet of Our Mothers* by Judy Welles and *My Many Mothers* by Vanessa Rush Southern.

Those present were then invited speak about their mothers and someone they had mothered, with photos of mothers shown on the screen. Altogether it was a moving celebration of what motherhood means to us all.

March 21st: This was a departure from the normal routine as we had been invited to join our Glasgow Unitarian congregation on Zoom for their evening service, led by Lyanne Mitchell on the theme **Don't Forget to Write**. Lyanne is a self-confessed "communication junkie". She extolled the power of the written word and lamented the fact that it seems to be a dying art. Emails are just not the same - and how many of them are preserved for future historians to study?

Lyanne said that a letter is a kind of historical artefact - witnessed by the fact that there are many "Letters of Note" to be found in museums up and down the country which tell us so much about the times in which they were written. She read us some examples. Finally, Lyanne said that letter writing can be viewed as a spiritual practice. If you are angry, write it out of your system! It's never too late to bring peace and healing into a relationship by writing a letter.

March 28th: This is the last service covered in this review and it was given by Rev Paul Walker, ably assisted by his son Sam. 21st March was **Down's Syndrome Sunday**. Sam has Down's Syndrome and Paul and Sam used the service to tell us about the wonderful relationship they have with each other. After the chalice lighting by Sam we were shown a series of ancient images of Down's Syndrome. It was clear that people with Down's were fully accepted in some cultures whereas others treated them appallingly.

When Sam was born a consultant at North Tees Hospital told Paul that, in his culture, you are considered to be blessed if you have a child with Down's Syndrome. Paul clearly had found that to be profoundly true. Sam is also very close to his elder sisters, Ellen and Jess, and even when Jess got married Sam was still the most important man in her life. He attends Riverside College, volunteers in Paul's NHS office doing various jobs to help people. His favourite TV show is *Strictly Come Dancing*.

It was evident from the discussion afterwards, that this lovely service had made a profound and lasting impression on everyone present.


