

Sunday services reviews for September and October 2024

On the 1st September 2024 the Worship leader was Diana Bebby, theme of "Autumn and Harvest" Diana

"Autumn and Harvest" Diana opened the service with Mikhail Pletnev paying Tschaikovsky's "September: The Hunt". We sang "For the fruits of all



creation", "Gather the Spirit", "Bring flowers to our altar", "From the crush of wealth and power" and "Lady of the seasons' laughter". Ben read Susan Efrid's poem "The Fruit and Vegetable Stand" and the other readings were poems and talks about various vegetables, during which we each held and looked at different vegetables. There are over 5,000 varieties of potatoes in the world, the original ones coming from the Americas. Squash goes back 11.000 years and there are numerous varieties. Diana read a poem by Marge Piecy "Attack of the squash people". This poem's satire is directed at the consumer of modern society which encourages people to buy and consume more than they need. A Spanish poem (in English) about onions (which are easy to grow). During the collection of the goods for The Mary Thompson Fund the music "English Country Garden" was played. We need to care for and nourish the soil, so that good food can be grown. There is enough food grown in the world to feed everyone if we cherish the planet. feed and rest the soil. Other music was Paul Reade's "Victorian Kitchen Garden" played by Emma on her clarinet and "Into the Unknown". We had one person on Zoom and five in the congregation.

On the 8th September 2024 the Worship leader was Rev Margaret Kirk, theme "A Tree"

We sang the hymns "Gather the Spirit"; "Spirit of earth, root, stone and tree"; "Wide Green World" and "Spirit of Life". Margaret's opening and closing words were by Rabindranath Tagore, an Indian polymath. Her readings were "The Laughing Tree" by Kent Nerburn from a book



Small Graces and "The Music of the Maple" by Tahmima Anam. A book commissioned by The Woodland Trust. Margaret spoke about her favourite trees, particularly a Birch tree and asked members of the congregation about their favourite trees.

On the 15th September 2024 the Worship leader was Rev Victor Ball We sang "The Tides of the Spirit", "The Spirit Conquers All", "Look at the Hillside", and "We limit not the truth of God".

With 10 in the congregation and one on Zoom

On the 22nd September 2024 the Worship leader was Rev Paul Walker The theme was "Who am I?"

Reading was "We wear the Mask" by Paul Laurence Dunbar

We wear the mask that grins and lies, It hides our cheeks and shades our eyes, This debt we pay to human guile; With torn and bleeding hearts we smile, And mouth with myriad subtleties. Why should the world be over-wise, In counting all our tears and sighs? Nay, let them only see us, while We wear the mask.

We smile, but, O great Christ, our cries To thee from tortured souls arise. We sing, but oh the clay is vile Beneath our feet, and long the mile; But let the world dream otherwise,

We wear the mask!

In Venice they hid behind their masks to conceal who they were.

Paul played two pieces of music "Take a good look at my face" by Bob Dylan, and "You Ought to Hear Me Cry" by Willie Nelson.

There are seven ages of man, and the most honest are infant and the last. We get children to wear a mask by teaching them how to behave. Then they rebel against adult rules in adolescence, but paradoxically conforming with their peers. We hide our problems, so do not show the real us. We have hidden strengths that no one else knows about.





On 29th September the Worship leader was Vince McCully (President of the General Assembly 2023-2024)

The theme was "Does Unitarianism have a future?"

We sang "We sing now together", "Now thank we all our God", "O worship the King", "Immortal Invisible" and "Lord as we part".

One prayer was: "An American Indian Prayer" by Lakota Chief Yellow Lark

Vince read a story, (from Harmony, A treasury of Chinese wisdom), with the help of his friends, about a small kingdom called Chu where the King and his court frittered away their time and money; but did not see how the kingdom's people suffered. Zhuan Zin,



one of the ministers, eventually got the King to learn from his mistakes, saved the kingdom which once again grew prosperous and stable.

Vince had two readings "Freedom" from the prophet by Khalil Gibran, and "Kalama Sutta" The Buddha's Charter for free Inquiry.

On the 6th October 2024 Christine Walker led our worship, which involved a meditation observing our surroundings from where we were sitting. We sang "Core of silence" and "Name unnamed".

On the 13th October 2024 the Worship leader was Rev Victor Ball We sang "Gather Us In", "Prayer for Strength", "Life of Ages, Richly Poured", "Break not the Circle" and "Song of Peace". With seven in the congregation

On the 20th October 2024 the Worship leader was Rev Paul Walker Theme "Luke's little summer"

We had a congregation in chapel of 8 and 4 people on Zoom

Any spell of quiet, dry weather starting on this day (around 18th October) has its origins in folk lore based on the Feast of St Luke.

Although he is the patron saint of physicians, surgeons, artists and butchers, his name has traditionally been linked to St Luke's little summer.

For centuries farmers must have noticed a period of better weather at the

autumn harvest, but the term Indian Summer is recent and refers to Native Americans gathering their harvest (corn on the cob) later than in Britain.

We sang "The ceaseless flow of endless time", "Look to the hillside", "How wonderful this world of thine", and "Earth is a gift of God's creation".

Congregational Support Toolkit is Live

On 9 September 2024, Unitarians from across the UK gathered online, to view the new Congregational Support Toolkit. Hosted by Simon Bland, Liz Slade and Lizzie Kingston-Harrison, the Toolkit replaces the old and much-loved 'Help is at Hand' guidebook for Unitarian Administrators. Covering everything from employment policies for ministers, and staff, to charity law and copyright issues, it's a necessary guide for those of us who run our congregations, as our resources have often diminished, whilst at the same time the complexity of charity law and other issues facing us has increased.

Those present discussed the Toolkit, offered feedback on its layout, and suggested content we wanted to see. As ever, we had a wide-ranging discussion about issues we face. One topic, perhaps beyond the scope of the Toolkit, but very important, was the need for exploring what 'Ministry without Ministers' looks like, given that many of our congregations do not, and cannot have, a minister. How do we minister to each other and our communities? Perhaps that is our next challenge! Thanks to all those involved in creating the Toolkit, it looks set to be a valuable resource.

Handing over the Silverware - 5 September 2024

One of Newcastle Unitarians' more interesting – and valuable – inheritances from our forebears is a set of silverware, which we think was used for Communion:

- 2 silver cups
- 2 silver salvers
- 1 silver jug

The items belonged to Rev. George Harris, one of the most prominent leaders of our congregation and our minister during the years 1845 – 1859. He was responsible for our formal name, the Church of the Divine Unity.



We also inherited silver 'coins of the realm', dating from 1852, which were located under the old New Bridge Street church's foundation stones during building works in the 1950s – most likely during construction of the City Library (the building prior to the glass building which stands there now).

As we no longer have anywhere to display them, the trustees pondered what to do, and decided we would like to gift them to Newcastle City Council, as a mark of the long-standing relationship between the Council and the Unitarian congregation. The connection between Newcastle upon Tyne Unitarians and Newcastle City Council goes back to our very earliest days as a congregation. Our historical records state that:

"...in August 1669, the town sergeant [of Newcastle upon Tyne] broke up a meeting at Rev. Richard Gilpin's house (near where the Hanover Square Chapel later stood). The information laid before the town magistrates named Richard Gilpin, William Durant, Henry Leaver and Richard Pringle as the preachers. Also present were four past sheriffs, four ex-mayors, one future mayor, some of the aldermen, the town's physician, the town surveyor, and about thirty other well-to-do burgesses, with, in some cases, their wives. (No wonder the magistrates had been reluctant to enforce the law!)"


At this time, the Act of Uniformity in 1662 prescribed by law the Protestant

faith as practised by the Church of England as the only lawful form of worship. Any clergy who had not sworn an oath that they would only conduct worship in the manner prescribed by the Book of Common Prayer could not legally lead a congregation; they became known as 'Nonconformist' and some of them, including our founders, later became known as Unitarian. In 1672, King Charles II issued a Declaration of Indulgences which suspended the laws against nonconformists, and allowed some of them to obtain licences to preach.

Sometime later, a prominent member of the congregation, James Losh Senior, was appointed as the Honorary Recorder of Newcastle (the most senior Civil and Criminal Judge) in 1828. Another member of our congregation in the 1880s, Councillor Joseph B. Ellis, was the Mayor of the city, and would later become the first Lord Mayor of the city. More recently, one of our trustees, Eleanor Broad, was the Deputy Lady Mayor in 1960.

Newcastle City Council already has an impressive collection of silverware in the city's 'Silver Gallery', and the Lord Mayor's office was happy to accept the gift. On 5 September 2024, three trustees – Louise, Brian, and David – visited the Lord Mayor, Cllr Rob Higgins to hand over the items. Over coffee and cake, we discussed the items' history, the long history of Newcastle upon Tyne, and the future of our congregation. The Lord Mayor suggested the items might go on display at the Mansion House – the former home of Newcastle's Lord Mayors, now used for civic functions – as the Silver Gallery is running out of room! We agreed we were happy about this, and that we hope that there can be a future ceremony to unveil them when a display space is found. We will keep everyone posted!


